According to the *Harvard Business Review*, competition in the job market continues to heat up, while at the same time, the number of people getting undergraduate degrees continues to rise, spurring many firms to require master's degrees for employment.

Leading financial magazine Forbes, on the other hand, points out that a master's degree "can be a badge of honor for some and a big sunk cost for others."

CONS

Money, Money, Money: Advanced degrees cost money...sometimes, a lot of money! The cost to obtain a master's degree ranges from \$30,000 to \$120,000, with the average about \$40,000. Depending on the field of study, obtaining a doctoral degree can cost anywhere from \$163,600-\$327,200. Therefore, if you are a full-time student, you need to assess whether or not you can afford to finish.

Time As A Resource: Obtaining a master's degree

can take anywhere from one to three years of continuous study; the average is two years. Pursuing a doctoral degree can take three to eight years; the average is just under six years. That is a lot of time to be a student and can put you at a disadvantage in terms of work experience, unless you are considering a career in academia, in which case, it is an advantage to have a doctorate.

It Might Not Make A Difference: You may not necessarily get a better job or a higher salary with an advanced degree. According to Forbes, education is only one aspect of your career path.
